# Curriculum Enrichment Programs

Nature Operations Division can offer your class or group many options for programs in our parks or in your facility. Our curriculum Enrichment Programs target grade levels to help you meet the Sunshine State Standards, but they are also flexible and can be adapted to different age ranges. Let us know what we can do for you!

Programs marked with an \* can be brought to any school. Programs are designed for 30 students with a minimum charge for 15.

A Farm Adventure (Pre-School) \$3.00 per participant

Visit Grandma's Farm as it was at the last half of the 19th century. Students walk through the garden, visit the cabin and kitchen, and tour the barnyard while discussing 1870's life. Emphasis is

placed on the differences and similarities between objects from yesterday and today, as well as, the importance of items found on the farm. Vocabulary stresses the names of objects and animals, as well as descriptive terms associated with color, smell and texture. Length: I hour

### \*Sensing Nature (Kindergarten) \$4.00 per participant

Discover the wonders of nature through the senses of touch, sight, smell and hearing. While rotating through five stations, students will use their 5 senses to learn how different animals survive in nature. Activities will include using the sense of smell to locate food, identifying objects in nature using only your hands, and using special goggles to simulate how some birds view the world. Emphasis is on descriptive vocabulary for concepts such as pattern, texture, smell and color.

Length: 75 minutes

SSS: Language Arts, Physical Education, Science

\*Crítter Connections (1st Grade) \$4.00 per participant

Bats, birds, and bugs - Oh My! Through a series of sorting and grouping activities students will develop classification skills. In addition students will observe live and preserved specimens. Emphasis is on

identifying the characteristics which distinguish mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish from each other and from insects and other invertebrates.

Length: 75 minutes

SSS: Language Arts, Science, The Arts

\*Animal Homes (2<sup>nd</sup> Grade) \$4.00 per participant

Investigate the basic needs of animals. Then review the characteristics and physical adaptations of animals by observing living and preserved specimens. Students work in groups to construct homes for particular animals which will illustrate their interactions with plants and introduce the idea of a food chain. Activities stress the need and reason for food,

shelter and space.

# In Gainesville's Nature Parks

Aquatic Encounter (3rd Grade) \$4.00 per participant

Examine an aquatic environment and the adaptations made by plants and animals associated with this

environment. Students rotate between two stations, one focusing on the environment's characteristics using field instruments such as thermometers, pH meters and a secchí dísk. The second group takes an up-close look at aquatic organisms using equipment such as dip nets, magnifying glasses and íllustrated guídes. Emphasís ís on vocabulary associated with

Native American Life in Early Florida (4th Grade) \$5.00 per participant

Explore the history and culture of an early Native American culture living in our area

- the Timucua-speaking Potano people. Learn how they effectively used the resources available to them in a way that gave them all they needed. Students will rotate among three stations of approximately 1 hour each, learning about crafts, such as fibers and pottery, foods and cooking methods and edible and

medicinal plants. Length: 3 hours

Exploring Florida's Environments (3rd Grade) \$4.00 per participant

Hike into three different ecosystems to introduce the communities found at Morningside. Learn to recognize some typical plants of each

community and do simple field tests to identify the factors that distinguish these areas. Students will have an opportunity discuss the adaptations that make an animal suitable for living in a specific community. Students will be provided with simple plant id guides to help

NEW! Critter Curiosity Lab \$2.50/participant
Parts are parts, until you find out who they belong to and what they are used for. A touch table and discovery approach will turn our critter

inventory into critter inquiry!

NEW! The Stream Scene \$2.50/participant Stream characteristics and inhabitants come alive on a photo guided stream tour. After the tour, we'll play in a stream and experience the tragedies of pollution in rivers and streams.

NEW! Fire Ecology \$2.50/participant

Fire is fantastic... or at least it can be when it is used to maintain and restore Florida's natural communities. Find out about fire ecology and plant and animal adaptations and responses to fire in the program where we discover what's really hot in Florida.

Snakes, Lizards and Toads, Oh My! \$2.50/participant

Get up Close and Personal with a variety of living and preserved reptiles and amphibians native to Florida. Learn what makes these two groups unique and yet similar in some strange ways.

SENSEsational Science \$2.50/participant

Discover the characteristics of sound waves and how they are transmitted, the difference between the human visible spectrum and that of other animals, and how "seeing isn't always believing" can help animals in their environment.

Things That Go Bump in the Night \$2.50/participant

Hear a howling at the window? A patter on the porch? Sounds in the night aren't really scary at all. We'll introduce you to the creatures that make these sounds and some fun facts about them. The dark won't seem so intimidating anymore.

Slither, Slide, Soar-Mechanics of Animal Motion \$2.50/ participant

Curíou's about what makes rabbits run or lizards leap? Through simple demonstrations we'll explore Laws of Motion and how animals are adapted to use these natural Laws to their advantage.

# Planning Your Program

#### **RESERVATIONS**

Please complete the School Program Request Form on the last page of this guide and return to Morningside either by truck mail, regular mail, or fax.

#### CONFIRMATIONS

We require a completed Program Request Form before we can confirm your program. Reservations are on a first-come first-served basis, but we will do our best to accommodate your requests. We will send you a written confirmation after we receive your Program Request Form. A confirmation packet will be sent approximately 4 weeks prior to your scheduled date which will include pre and post-trip information as well as a curriculum guide detailing your program.

#### **CHAPERONES**

The fees will be waived for one adult chaperone/teacher for every 5 students. All additional teachers/chaperones are charged at the student rate. Chaperones are responsible for managing discipline, conduct, and safety of their group.

#### **DETAILS**

FOM Bus scholarships may be requested, in writing, by SBAC Schools. Please request details when reserving a program at 334–3328. We can accommodate two 75 minute classes per morning: if you have more than the 30 students maximum allowed, we will schedule them in smaller groups.

If you need to cancel, please let us know so we can make your slot available to other groups. You will be charged for programs if you fail to show for your program without prior notification.

Souvenier bags will be available for the Farm Life and Native American Life Programs containing items related to the program for \$4.00 each if your students would like to purchase them. This is a great way to offer a souvenier and make sure that everyone gets the same thing. Please let us know if you are interested in this option and we will have them ready for your class.

#### **PROGRAMS**

Our science classes use our nature parks, preserved and live animals, and laboratory equipment in a hands-on approach. Our human ecology classes also use direct participation and actual artifacts or authentic reproductions of tools, techniques, foods, and other items pertinent to the programs. Our programs are suggested for specific grade levels but are often adapted for other groups such as: other grade levels, home schools, private schools, scout groups or other organizations.

These programs were designed using the Science Curriculum Objectives of the School Board of Alachua County and the Sunshine State Standards. Programs are multi-disciplinary and provide lessons in respect for living things as well as augmenting specific subject-oriented objectives. All programs are self-supporting and fees cover materials and instructor salaries.

### FARM & FOREST FESTIVAL SCHOOL DAYS ARE COMING!

Our 27th annual Farm & Forest Festival, North Florida's EDUCATIONAL historical reenactment, kicks off with SCHOOL DAYS on Thursday, April 28th & Friday, April 29th, 2005. At the Festival, students learn about life in North Central Florida during the mid-to-late 1800s at our Living History Farm. Students will view live historic-breed farm animals, hear period-authentic music, observe traditional crafts such as basketry, blacksmithing, spinning and weaving, soap making, and wood stove cooking, practiced by period-clothed demonstrators. The Living History Farm will be fragrant with the smells of old-time Southern cooking and joyous with the sounds of children playing in traditional ways. Three horse-drawn wagons are available to take your class along an interpreted trail through the Morningside woods. Four-Page Teacher's Guide is mailed to you upon receipt of your registration. Admission is 1/2 off regular admission prices of \$5 for adults, \$3 for children for all preregistered classes. At teacher's request, attendance is limited to 1,200 TOTAL each school day.
